Welcome to the Institute for Heritage Education! We are a group of educators and education supporters who, with the help of colleagues around the country, have launched this non-profit organization to support effective cultural heritage and cultural resource education. We believe that understanding and appreciating our cultural heritage and the cultural heritage of others is a route to a better, more peaceful world.

2019-2020

In late 2019, IHE received a donation of \$15,000 to set up operations and to initiate a small grant program (up to \$1,000) to support professional development for educators in formal and informal venues. In December, we distributed a Request for Proposals and received 15 proposals in February 2020. Eleven proposals for teacher workshops were funded (page 2). Due to the Covid-19 pandemic only two of the workshops have been completed. In March, the Bureau of Land Management and Southwest Colorado Canyons Alliance teamed up to host a workshop for heritage educators and the Arkansas Archaeological Survey offered a series of socially distanced workshops for 40 Arkansas teachers.
