2021 Highlights

Despite the continuing pandemic, IHE funded four new professional development projects, three of which were completed in 2021. A fourth project in North Carolina was delayed due to the pandemic. Our Colorado workshop was successfully delivered via distance learning. Additionally, one of our 2020 workshops was held in Illinois after a year's delay.

Two of our board members, Karen Wilson and Jeanne Moe, assisted with the Voices of the Ancients Landmarks Institute in Cedar City, Utah. The Institute was funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH).

The learning curve was steep, but we managed to apply for and receive our first federal grant from the Colorado Bureau of Land Management in September. The workshop will be held in Grand Junction in June of 2022.

We are proud to announce that we have received a Cultural Resources Protection Assistance Agreement from the Colorado Bureau of Land Management.

IHE has received funds for a cultural heritage institute for educators June 21-24, 2022, in Grand Junction, Colorado. The funding is courtesy of the Colorado State Office, USDI-Bureau of Land Management (BLM), through their cultural resources program. The institute will take place at the Museums of the West in Grand Junction.

This institute includes hands-on professional development with three Project Archaeology curricula: *Investigating Shelter, Investigating a Basin House*, and *Investigating Rock Art*; activities in the museum; the perspectives of Native American descendant community members; and a day of field learning at relevant archaeological sites in the area. The curricula and professional development are most applicable to upper elementary grades but may be adapted for secondary grades.

We thank Colorado BLM for the financial support and operational assistance in planning and conducting the institute. Many thanks to the Museums of the West for providing a venue for instruction and access to museum exhibits for interactive learning and to the John Wesley Powell Museum of Green River, Utah for sponsoring an informal learning instructor.

(1) The original 2021 budget included as expenses \$3,800 planned for four workshops that were funded but postponed in 2020 due to SARS-CoV-2 risk. Those workshops were again postponed in 2021, and the expenses now carry over to 2022 in the hope that the workshops can be held safely then.

(2) In September 2021, IHE received notice of a USDI-BLM grant award for a 2022 Colorado teacher institute; the grant will be accounted for in IHE's 2022 fiscal year.
